Reflections on S.A.L.T. in Washington D.C.



Thank you to everyone who generously supported, prayed for, and attended our 2024 Serving and Learning Trip (S.A.L.T.) in Washington, D.C.! We had a great time packing grocery bags with ALIVE! to be distributed to families in need, seeing the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial, visiting the National Museum of African American History and Culture, and fellowshipping with one another. Reflecting on S.A.L.T. in D.C., I would describe it as educational, inspiring, and motivating.

Traveling to D.C. is an educational experience. I tend

to think of DC as a hub of wealth and political power, a place of beautiful architecture and multimillion-dollar houses. However, D.C. is also marked by food insecurity and housing instability. Outside some of DC's best upscale restaurants are people who are hungry but unable to afford food. People without houses live in tents beside

beautiful luxury apartment buildings. Our S.AL.T. experience not only educated us about these disparities but also made us question whether this is the way the world has to be – or should be – and what we can do about it.

Our experience was equally inspiring. With ALIVE!, we packed 450 grocery bags to be delivered to families of four, benefiting a total of 1,800 people. By working together, we were able to pack the bags, reorganize the pallets, and clean our work areas in under two hours. We were able to do all of that with 16 people! Imagine the amount of work we could accomplish with 30 people, or 160, or even 1,600! When we work together, we have the ability to enact major positive change in our communities. It is inspiring to see how much we can accomplish when we work together.



Our trip also motivated us to ask important questions like: What can we do to assist those in our area experiencing food insecurity or housing instability? How can we contribute to helping those in need? How can we work toward a future where no person is hungry or lacks adequate shelter? In what ways can we make lasting and meaningful change and build up God's beloved community? MPC is already actively engaged in fostering posi-



tive change through initiatives like our B.O.W. program, the upcoming work trip to Mission at The Eastward in July, and our Courageous Conversations series where we explore additional opportunities to support the local community. Our desire to pursue these questions is also reflected in our commitment to being a Matthew 25 congregation. Matthew 25 calls us to serve one another and advocate for justice. Serving alongside food banks like ALIVE! is important, but does not address the underlying, systemic issues that create situations where people are hungry. When we advocate for justice, we draw attention to the injustices in our societies and ask for change, advocating for a world when no person is hungry. Our Matthew 25 challenge is to dedicate ourselves equally to justice and service, acknowledging the necessity of both.

After S.A.L.T. in Washington D.C., I am motivated to further explore how MPC can be engaged in activism and advocacy, working toward the realization of "justice rolling down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream." (Amos 5:24).



As February dawns, we look towards a period of prayer and reflection as Lent begins on the 14th. Rebecca Langer will lead a discussion on *A Different Kind of Fast*, at 9:30 am on Sunday mornings (see article next to this one). You do not need to be a member of The Joyful Hearts class to participate, everyone is welcome. Also, during the Sunday School hour, The Thoughtful Christian class will study and reflect upon the Belhar Confession, using *Lenten Reflections on the Confession of Belhar* (see page 4). And, available by February 11, a weekly devotional by Illustrated Ministry, *God is Still With Us* for personal prayer and reflection. 




DINNER & A MOVIE NIGHT

When we can walk into the store someday and get a tablet for just under a hundred bucks perhaps, I'll have achieved what I've always dreamed of doing for all choir members. Scan, click and send. Until then, I'm happy to have a work bag that weighs almost nothing, yet has more music loaded in it than I've ever been able to carry around. Braelyn and Jess don't have to wait for me to put my music away after worship anymore either, I just put my tablet in my bag! I'm happy to have taken the plunge and be one step closer to paper-free. Perhaps someday I'll see paper-free for all.
