Peace be with you,

As culture continues to shift and the world adjusts to life after 2020, researchers have begun to notice the rise in popularity of "third spaces." A third space is a place that people gather other than their homes and work (think about how popular local breweries have become).

Sunday mornings are an example of a time when MPC provides a third space. We love how our communal activities of worship, fellowship, and education bring us together. We also know that most folks in our surrounding communities are not going to just walk though our doors on a Sunday morning. So what if we found another day, time, and reason to provide a third space for people to gather together?

One way to provide this third space is by hosting a Farmer's Market in our parking lot. We tasked our contracted social media specialist, Mike Herald, to make connections and look into the feasibility of making this happen. To our surprise and delight we have 5-10 vendors who are willing to give this a try with us.

A new "outside-the-box" idea can have some anxieties that come with it, so here are a few things to know:

- There will be no access to MPC's facilities.
- Initially the vendors will be set up on the Sanctuary side and parking will be available on the other side.
- Mike Herald will be present at all times (staff members will often be present too).
- Vendors will be providing everything—tents, trash management, etc...
- All vendors are responsible for their required license(s), permit(s), and insurance.
- All activities will be monitored and reviewed with adjustments made as needed; MPC reserves the right to cancel the event.

My hope is to eventually build off of this gathering in our parking lot and introduce a Friday evening open mic or coffeehouse or worship option, inviting folks into our indoor third space and introducing the broader community to our wonderful community of faith.

It's all new and exciting. We hope you come and check it out!

A Thriving Together Update

In this program, we have learned a lot about racial justice, we have begun to explore our own church's historical narrative, and we have started building relationships with members from other congregations also dedicated to antiracism work.

The Thriving Together program has introduced us to many, many resources to learn more about antiracism and justice work. Here are a few you might add to your summer reading list:

Thriving Together Resources:

Been in the Struggle: Pursuing an Antiracist Spirituality by Regina S. Stoltzfus and Tobin M. Shearer

Provides insight into how to sustain long-lasting antiracism efforts – an antiracist spirituality.

The Color of Compromise: The Truth about the American Church's Complicity in Racism by Jemar Tisby

An introduction to the relationship between the church and racism from colonialism to today. The Color of Law by Richard Rothstein

A look into the history of American housing policy and segregation.

The Good Samaritan: Luke 10 for the Life of the Church by Emerson B. Powery

A collection of interpretations of the Good Samaritan from a variety of diverse perspectives.

The Hidden Roots of White Supremacy and the Path to a Shared American Future by Robert Jones.

Explores the origins of white supremacy in America and proposes models for racial healing.

The Cross and the Lynching Tree by James Cone


An introduction to Black liberation theology that looks into the history of lynching in the United States. Cone draws a connection between lynching and the crucifixion of Jesus.

Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson

The Hate U Give by Angle Thomas

A young adult novel that addresses topics including microaggressions and police brutality.

- We opened our April Session meeting with prayer and dinner!
- After examination, we welcomed the 2024 Confirmation Class: Kylee Bell, Logan Lichty, Libby McCurdy, Elyse Moll, and Chloe Querry. They will be officially welcomed during the 11am worship service on May 19.
- We voted that all pastors, Ruling Elders, and Deacons—past and present— may represent the Church at communion for the homebound.
- We approved work on the manse kitchen not to exceed \$40,000. Some details:
 - This work was originally scheduled for 2020, but was postponed due to COVID.
 - Although not currently being sold, the property would need this work down before it could be put on the market.
 - The money is not coming out of the operating budget and is NOT part of the +\$5 giving campaign that is focused on eliminating the deficit.
 - Repairs include: replacing "office sized" appliances, floors (cracked from being placed over an elevator—yes you read that right), paint, replacing laminate counters that are cracked, etc...
 - The elevator has already been removed—THANK YOU ROD AND KEVIN!!!
- We approved the Farmer's Market to be run in the MPC parking lot from May 3, 2024 thru November 1, 2024 (see front page of the newsletter).
- We closed our meeting by sharing our prayers and concerns, singing the *Gloria Patri*, and celebrating Pastor Emily moderating her first Session meeting!

This month's selection is *The Secret Book of Flora Lea* by Patti Callahan Henry, a 2023 nominee for Best Historical Fiction.

From Goodreads: When a woman discovers a rare book that has connections to her past, long-held secrets about her missing sister and their childhood spent in the English countryside during World War II are revealed. In the war-torn London of 1939, fourteen-year-old Hazel and five-year-old Flora are evacuated to a rural village to escape the horrors of the war. Hazel fills their days with walks and games to distract her young sister, including one that she creates for her sister and her sister alone—a fairy tale about a magical land, a secret place they can escape to that is all their own. Then the unthinkable happens when young Flora suddenly vanishes while playing near the banks of the river. Shattered, Hazel blames herself for her sister's disappearance. Twenty years later, Hazel is in London, when her tidy life is turned upside down as she unwraps a package containing an illustrated book called Whisperwood and the River of Stars . Hazel never told a soul about the imaginary world she created just for Flora. Could this book hold the secrets to Flora's disappearance? Could it be a sign that her beloved sister is still alive after all these years?



Community CARES provides reassurance, rest and resources to those experiencing housing insecurity in Cumberland County, PA. They are the Walk-in access site for Coordinated Entry in Cumberland County. Community CARES has three separate locations sheltering approximately 120 men, women, and children a night in Cumberland County. In order to provide the maximum benefit to the community, CARES works hard to avoid duplication of resources that are currently being offered in the community and makes every effort to collaborate with other organizations. Generous volunteers, businesses, churches, individuals, organizations, and foundations partner and support CARES to ensure that, if there is a vital need in the community, it remains in existence.

News from your Safety Committee - The power of "HELLO"



The Safety Committee's mission is to promote a safer environment when we are gathered for worship. Everyone at MPC plays a role in our overall safety efforts.

We are MPC... More People Caring. We welcome ALL. But what do you do when you see someone whose behavior seems suspicious or makes you "uncomfortable". In other safety articles, we've suggested that if you see something, say something and to trust your instincts. We've also suggested that it's important to keep in mind that factors such as race, ethnicity, gender, and/or religious affiliation are NOT indicators of suspicious behavior.

Simply saying "Hello" can prompt a casual conversation with unknown individuals. Through this simple interaction, you can observe and evaluate potential suspicious behaviors to determine if you should report to staff or to law enforcement through 9-1-1.

If the person is a guest looking for a new church home, your warm "Hello" will be a welcome and friendly outreach. If the person has intent to cause harm, your warm "Hello" will let them know that you and others are aware of their presence. Acknowledging a risk can significantly deter a threat.

Once you greet with "Hello", the next step is to actively listen for an appropriate response. Smile, make eye contact, and introduce yourself.

- "Hello, how are you?"
- "Welcome, is this your first time here?"
- "Are you visiting us today, or are you a member I've not yet had the pleasure of meeting?"
 - "Is there any way I can assist you?"
 - "Are you looking for something or someone in particular?"
 - "I will be here in case you need assistance."

After a warm welcome and a greeting of "Hello", you should pay particular attention to any facts to support a rational conclusion that the person's behavior is suspicious. If saying "Hello" isn't your thing or if the situation makes you uncomfortable, find someone on staff or someone you know and ask if they would make the greeting.

Accidents and spills are a daily part of kindergarten life for the 300 full day students at the Mechanicsburg's Kindergarten Academy.

Parents are requested to keep a change of clothing in their child's backpack, but that request is not always followed.

The school nurse tries to maintain an inventory of underwear, socks, sweatpants, and shorts for when the child does not have a change of clothing, but she does not have a budget for these items.

Wanna Be a Presby Peeler???


How would you like to hang out in a kitchen with a fun group while prepping some delicious foods to help a local group home for adults with intellectual disabilities?

Then we welcome you to Presby Peelers! This wonderful group of volunteers began in 2012 with members and friends of MPC. The program has grown over the years and evolved into a weekly event that runs from July through mid-Nov. Here's the low-down.

Each Wednesday, a group of 6-7 volunteers meet at Cumberland Vista House (a part of the CROSS program), which is a house between Mechanicsburg and Dillsburg, from 9-11am. A "team leader" decides on recipes to prep each time. We prepare donated produce from Oak Grove Farms and Spiral Path, along with meats, poultry or fish, into casseroles, salads, sides, or desserts for the residents to eat that week or freeze for future meals.

Our work is very much appreciated by the staff at Cumberland Vista and the residents. It truly is a joy to serve. We have prep jobs for all cooking abilities and physical limitations, so, yes, you can do this!!! No, you don't need tons of experience, just a willingness to help others by making them something to eat. You can volunteer as little or as much as you wish and fits your schedule. Any age, any gender, any ability = YOU
